The National Civilian Community Corps (NCCC) is a full time, team based, residential program for participants ages 18–24 years of age. Members commit to 10 months of service, they are assigned to various participating non–profit sites around the USA.

While team Blue 6 was on Kauai serving Kauai Habitat for Humanity, they completed installation of over 2,000 feet of dust fence. The dust fence is a requirement to begin our much anticipated Ele'ele Iluna Phase II development.

Team Blue 6 also helped with our Anahola house move project. All members are chainsaw certified, perfect skills for removing branches and trees that have been blocking progress of the house move.

Several team members also spent days in Kekaha, installing drywall on the Beniamina Repair and Renovation home. Native Hawaiian homeowner, Kanani Beniamina was so appreciative of their service: she presented the members with puka shell necklaces she hand crafted. They were honored to receive such thoughtful, and meaningful gifts.
