Eleele Iluna Subdivision Phase II Progress

- Wa`alani Enterprises has been selected as the contractor to perform the roadwork for Phase II of the subdivision.
- The dust fence along the property was completed in the summer thanks to Team D'Alessandro with AmeriCorps NCCC.
- Financing is in place and Kaua'i Habitat is now awaiting an NPDES permit from the County of Kaua'i. Once permits are issued, we will begin the long-awaited process of turning ground.
- Nearly 2,000 families are waiting for an opportunity to own an affordable home.
 The work to be conducted on Phase II of the subdivision will pave the way for another 107 affordable homes to be built in `Ele`ele.

Hawai'i Habitat for Humanity Association Statewide Build-A-Thon

In September, Kaua`i Habitat participated in the Hawai`i Habitat for Humanity

Association's Statewide Build-A-Thon. Each of the seven Hawaii affiliates (Hilo, West Hawai'i, Maui, Molokai, Honolulu, Leeward Oahu, and Kauai) held build events over two days from September 14-15. 800 volunteers worked on 12 homes and raised \$80,000 as part of the statewide effort.

On Kauai, approximately 40 volunteers gathered to start construction on two lots in Anahola for the McDermott and Kaneholani families.

Lunch was generously provided by the local Honsador Lumber staff. Honsador was also one of the sponsors of the statewide event.

Day one consisted of clearing the McDermott lot to prepare it for foundation work. Crews also worked to erect dust

fences around the Kaneholani property located further down the road. On day two, volunteer teams erected the dust fence at the McDermott lot. On the Kaneholani site they finished dust fence installation and were also able to begin foundation work by digging footings for the home.

Kaua`i Habitat, the McDermotts, and the Kaneholanis are thankful to all the volunteers who came out that weekend to help the families begin their journey to homeownership. Among the individuals who came to pitch in during the two-day event were neighbors, family and friends, volunteers from the Kauai Cherry Blossom festival, Honsador Lumber, and AmeriCorps.

• The September 2013 Build-A-Thon marked the beginning of another two new homes in Anahola on Dept. of Hawaiian Homelands. The two homes are now framed, with trusses on the Kaneholani home and truss installation to happen in the coming weeks on the McDermott home.
